



COMMUNITY COLLABORATION FOR CHILDREN

Community Collaboration for Children (CCC) services are designed to be community based services that promote the safety, well-being, strength and stability of children and families; while focusing on increasing the awareness and preventing child abuse and/or neglect. These services address the children's physical, mental, emotional and educational needs in addition to helping families move toward healthy long-term safety and stability.

CCC staff conduct parenting classes and provide In-Home Services. Following a discussion with the referral source about the program's services and because participation in the program is voluntary, the family must consent to participate. The CCC In-Home Specialist, together with the referral source, will work with each family to help meet their specific goals. Such services may include: Improving parenting skills, Reduced parent stress and isolation, Encouraging parent involvement in children's learning, Providing greater access to resources, Improving family communication, Decreasing risky behavior in children.

Northeast's CCC program strives to make an already difficult situation as easy as possible by treating each party with respect and assisting in any way we can to help meet their case goals. Our staff provides coaching and mentoring for parents in all areas of need to ensure family stability. Meetings are held in the least intrusive environment for the family, such as the family's home, church, library, a friend's home, or schools. The In-Home Services goals are achieved through meeting with the family for two to three hours per week for an average of eight weeks. Interventions are aimed at assisting families in learning to live together in an environment that is safe and nurturing.

Referrals can be made by any community partner, Dept for Community Based Services, or a family can refer themselves to the program.

Along with services, CCC requires a Regional Network in each service area. The Regional Network has established goals of child safety and family stability and is comprised of community partners and parents who work together to reduce the risk of child abuse and neglect. The primary responsibility of the network is to reach out within local communities to build the awareness of the importance of preventing the abuse and/or neglect of children.

All services are provided in the counties of Boyd, Carter, Elliott, Greenup, and Lawrence.

COMMUNITY SERVICES BLOCK GRANT

The Social Services Program is administered through the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) funding. The funding allows Northeast to operate six offices in the agency's five-county service area. Each county takes applications, makes referrals, and provides services to the low-income individuals in the area. We are looked upon as the agency most able to provide assistance during crisis situations. The CSBG offices administer the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) to help families who meet income guidelines to obtain assistance with the high costs of heating bills. The staff works closely with the local utility providers to insure that no family is without adequate heat.

Columbia Gas Energy Assistance Program (EAP)

Columbia Gas of Kentucky's Energy Assistance

Program (EAP) is designed to supplement the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP). EAP works by providing participants with a subsidy each month of the winter heating season (November - March). The subsidy is credited to the participant's Columbia Gas account each month. This program is only available in Boyd, Greenup and Lawrence Counties.

HEART and THAW Programs

In collaboration with Kentucky Power, a heating

assistance program was approved by the Public Service Commission. The HEART Program provides a monthly credit to income qualifying KY Power customer's bill during the months of Jan - April. The THAW program provides a credit to any KY Power customer that is experiencing an unexpected hardship.

Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP)

LIHEAP is a federally-funded program that helps low-income households with their home energy bills. LIHEAP may be able to provide bill payment assistance to income qualifying households. During times of extreme temperatures, funds may be allocated to assist with cooling costs. The program is divided into two phases: Subsidy and Crisis.

- **Subsidy** – Based upon family size and income, households receive pre-determined amounts that are sent directly to their utility provider to assist with heating costs.
- **Crisis** – Households who are assisted in this program have to be in or will soon be facing a heating crisis. The household must be within 48 hours of having their utilities disconnected or within four days of being without coal, wood, propane, or kerosene.

Lonnie M Click & Owen Fielding Memorial Scholarship

Scholarships are awarded each year to area students who fall within the economic guidelines. Students must be accepted at an accredited facility of higher education or vocational school and must reside within our five county service area.

Applications are available during the month of February of each year. Applications may be obtained from the Guidance Counselor of each high school in Boyd, Carter, Elliott, Greenup or Lawrence County. Applications may also be obtained by calling the Central Office and requesting one. The deadline to submit the completed application is March 31.

Senior Citizen Commodity Program

In collaboration with God's Pantry, Carter County has a Senior Commodity Program that serves 472 senior citizens. Applicants receive a monthly supply of various nutritional food items.

Wintercare

This is a program for Columbia Gas customers only. Donations are accepted from customers and in collaboration with Northeast, low-income clients are screened and may be approved for a credit toward their Columbia Gas account. This program is only available in Boyd, Greenup and Lawrence counties.

KENTUCKY HEALTH BENEFIT EXCHANGE

(KHBE), is Kentucky's program to oversee the Commonwealth's implementation of the Affordable Care Act. Through the Exchange, individuals in Kentucky can be connected to HealthCare.gov to shop for health insurance, compare costs and plans, and apply for premium subsidies and tax credits. Individuals can also determine their eligibility for Medicaid and the Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program.

A team of Health Benefit Application Assisters working under the auspices of NKCAA continues to be available to provide support and help to residents at various locations throughout Boyd, Carter, Elliott, Greenup and Lawrence Counties. Health Benefit Assisters served a total of 1,092 Medicaid contracts covering 1,411 individuals and 92 Qualified Health Plans (QHP) covering 136 individuals.

The service is provided at no cost to our residents. Assisters may also determine eligibility for enhanced Medicaid and Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program (KCHIP), as well as Qualified Health Insurance Plans for individuals regardless of income. In addition, catastrophic health insurance assistance for small business are available.

Our Health Benefit Application Assisters must complete an intensive program for recertification each year and maintain an awareness of all changes in the law and accompanying regulations in a changing environment. Their work is undertaken in cooperation with the Department of Community Based Services, Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, medical providers and insurance professionals.

Assisters also facilitate outreach and educational events to raise awareness of the federally facilitated marketplace. Northeast Assisters are available for individual appointments or can offer help during one of our community events offered within the counties we serve.

HEAD START PROGRAM

The Head Start Program promotes school readiness by enhancing the social and cognitive development of children through the provision of education, health, nutrition, and other services that are provided to the enrolled children and their families.

Parent Engagement Activities - We recognize the important role parents play in the education of their children. From the very first meeting with the family, the parents are encouraged to actively participate in the program. Parents are invited to attend parent meetings, participate in the Health Advisory, Policy Council and volunteer in the program. Parents' input and involvement are critical to the success of the program; for they bring unique perspectives, ideas and experiences. As parents are their child's first and most important teacher, parents have an important role in the program. Parents are always welcome in the classroom by helping with or leading activities or projects, planning classroom activities with the teaching staff, helping other parents feel welcome and reinforcing learning at home.

Preparing Children for Kindergarten - Maintaining positive relationships with families, communicating regularly with families, and encouraging family engagement are important aspects of our program. We begin preparing children for kindergarten the day they enter our Head Start classrooms. Our teaching staff focuses on building children's skills especially in the areas of Social/Emotional Development, Physical Development, Cognitive Development, and Language and Literacy. Throughout the year, teachers conduct home visits and conferences with parents to talk about how their child's skills are progressing. At the final conference of the year, parents receive information about what their child has learned and are given suggestions for parent/child activities during the summer that will enhance their child's readiness for kindergarten.

Classroom Observations - The Creative Curriculum, which is aligned with the assessment system, Teaching Strategies Gold, is utilized in all of our classrooms. Children are assessed based on direct observation.

Class Reliable Observers complete observations in all of our Head Start classrooms two times a year (Fall and Spring quarters) using *The Pre-K Classroom Assessment Scoring System (CLASS)*. The CLASS tool is used to monitor three domains and ten dimensions of teacher-child interactions and measures those observed interactions on a seven point scale. During the school year of 2019-2020, our CLASS scores indicate that our program overall has increased scores in Emotional Support and Classroom Organizations.

The Elliott County School District collaborates with Northeast Head Start to operate the Kentucky State pre-school program for their county. Northeast Head Start has a funded enrollment of 310 children, 67.74% of the children are from income qualifying families and 16% of the children served had one or more disabilities. Additional children are enrolled throughout the year as slots become available.

NORTHEAST CATERING

The Northeast Catering Program prepares and delivers nutritional meals to Title III Senior Centers and Nutrition Sites, Head Start Classrooms, Adult Daycare Centers, as well as meals for local activities and events. Meals are delivered to the five Senior Centers and three Nutrition Sites meet the specifications set forth in the "Meal Standards for the Older American Act" published by the Cabinet for Human Resources, Division of Aging Services. Meals prepared for the Northeast Head Start classrooms meet the guidelines established by the Child and Adult Care Food Program and Head Start Performance standards. Northeast Catering Program provides a hot nutritious meal to senior citizens and Head Start children, who in some cases would not have the resources to have a hot meal everyday.

RURAL TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM

The expense of owning and maintaining a vehicle takes a large portion of many families budget, with many families having to rely on public transportation to meet their needs. Northeast Kentucky Community Action Agency strives to provide affordable and reliable public transportation. We want everyone who utilizes our service to know that they can rely on us to get them where they need to go.

Northeast has provided over one million rides for residents of Boyd, Carter, Elliott, Greenup, and Lawrence counties since its beginning in 1976. Transportation is available to the general public for a reasonable fee. Riders can count on courteous drivers for safe efficient transportation to school, work, shopping, senior citizen centers, adult and child care centers, medical facilities, and recreational destinations. Operating hours are Monday – Friday, 8:00 AM - 4:30 PM.

Intercity Bus Service

Northeast provides Intercity Bus Services for the following counties: Boyd, Carter, Elliott, Greenup, and Lawrence. The Intercity Bus Service provides transportation to the general public. This service meets the inter-city travel needs of residents and makes a connection between non-urbanized areas and larger regional public transportation operations. Intercity routes are available to larger cities for a fee. The fee depends on which city you want to go.


Intercity Greyhound Bus – Connection

Northeast Kentucky Community Action Agency provides a feeder service to the Greyhound Bus stop in Ashland, KY. We also provide a feeder service, to get to the Lexington, KY airport. To access this service you will need call and schedule 48 hours in advance.

Northeast's regular public transportation services are operated on a demand response schedule, which means appointments are required for rides. This service is provided for a fee and a 24 hour notice is required to schedule a trip. With a limited number of vehicles available to serve five counties for transportation services, trips are scheduled on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Rates are as follows:

In city limits:	\$1.00/stop
1-5 miles:	\$5.00/round trip
6-20 miles:	\$10.00/round trip
21-50 miles:	\$25.00/round trip
Over 50 miles:	\$1.00 per mile per round trip (\$25 + \$1.00 per mile over 50 miles)



Transportation fares will be collected at time of service and correct change is required.

Transportation is also provided to VA hospitals for veterans at no charge. Veterans need to call and make an appointment at least 72 hours in advance.

Safe transportation for our clients and our drivers is our number one priority. Transportation services may be cancelled due to inclement weather. During times of bad weather, we ask that clients call our office to verify appointments.

SENIOR CITIZEN SERVICES

Our mission is to provide a Clean, Safe and Fun Environment to assist in preserving the individual Dignity, Self Respect and Independence of the Senior Citizens within our Communities through effective leadership, education and delivery of programs and services.

To accomplish our Mission, we operate a Senior Citizen Center in each of our five counties, along with two nutrition sites within those counties. Our Seniors enjoy the experience of many different activities and educational opportunities that are offered in the centers. Some of which are depicted in the photos, such as the King and Queen Ball, making and painting arts and crafts or being taught the art of making items out of cardboard, such as a piano. In addition to these fun activities, educational or health programs are offered that are designed specifically for Senior Citizen needs, such as financial workshops and healthy eating programs are given. To meet their nutritional needs, a daily meal is served at the centers and home-bound meals are provided to Seniors that are unable to get out. Transportation is also provided for the Seniors to and from the centers at no charge, in addition, necessary stops as needed at grocery stores or other needed stops are provided to assist them in staying independent. Our Seniors further participate in special trips to points of interest or just a fun day out at a different location with a picnic lunch. Our Senior Citizen Centers and programs are geared to help improve the Senior community and enhance their mental, physical, and social needs of those we serve.

WEATHERIZATION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

The Weatherization Assistance Program enables low income families to permanently reduce their energy bills by making their homes more energy efficient. Funds are used to improve the energy performance of dwellings of low-income families using the most advanced technologies and testing protocols available in the housing industry. This project is funded, in part, under a contract with Community Action Kentucky and Kentucky Housing Corporation, with funds allocated by Kentucky Housing Corporation through the United States Department of Energy and Health and Human Service.

The services that Weatherization provides include health and safety measures, air infiltration measures, water heater jackets, duct wrap, attic insulation, wall and floor insulation and crews do incidental repairs that are necessary in order to install or protect a weatherization measure. The dwelling is given a pre-inspection evaluation to determine what measures can be installed, and a cost analysis is completed to determine the savings/investment ratio. Dept of Energy guidelines determine if our crews can proceed with weatherization measures based upon the savings/investment ratio. If it determined that weatherization measures can improve the dwelling's energy efficiency, our weatherization crews work on site to install the energy savings measures.

The Weatherization Assistance Program received funding from two sources this year. Funds were received as part of Regular Weatherization in the amount of \$263,025. We also received Weatherization/LIHEAP Funds in the amount of \$422,285. Our crews completed 33 dwellings and helped those households spend less on their heating and cooling bills along with replacing 9 older high electricity usage refrigerators with new energy star refrigerators. Old refrigerators are one of the highest energy using appliances in households. We spent a total of \$522,573 in our five county areas.

We have also collaborated with Kentucky Power (**DSM Program**) and Grayson R.E.C.C., which provided an additional \$89,912 funding to further invest in homes for more energy efficiency measures. Kentucky Power and Grayson R.E.C.C. have contributed to us installing 27 heat pumps.

WarmWise Program - Columbia Gas of Kentucky offers a high efficiency furnace replacement program known as WarmWise. This program is offered to those Columbia Gas low-income applicants that apply for the Weatherization Assistance Program. WarmWise was designed to reduce the energy consumption of their customers by replacing older inefficient natural gas furnaces with a 90% efficient unit. The client must have an existing natural gas furnace with an efficiency rating of 78% AFUE or less. We have installed one energy efficient unit this contract year.

WORKFORCE INNOVATION & OPPORTUNITY ACT

The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act Program (WIOA), is implemented through a variety of service structures to youth and adults in Carter, Elliott and Lawrence counties of the Northeast Kentucky Community Action Agency service area. WIOA is funded by Eastern Kentucky Concentrated Employment Program (EKCEP, Inc.), through allocations from the United States Department of Labor, of the Kentucky Education Cabinet, Division of Workforce Services. We offer professional career guidance and job seeker assistance through a comprehensive realm of service delivery structure.

Job Clubs make available a hub of activity in providing peer interaction and career guidance support to area job seekers. Members meet weekly to discuss progress, current workforce news and employment obstacles while learning of current job seeking strategies. Meetings are interactive and are curriculum based in order to provide best practices.

Career Advising opportunities are provided to individuals who seek assistance in our Career Centers and WIOA offices by expert Career Advisors. Individual Employment Plans provide the service foundation to establish needs and barriers.

One-Stop Partners - Community Partnerships are established with Adult Education, Office of Employment and Training, Employers, Vocational Rehabilitation, Department of Veterans, KCTCS system, Economic Development Associates and other Workforce Stakeholders to present a comprehensive plan of action to benefit individuals, families and communities.

WIOA Program Funded Service Eligibility that involves monetary benefits varies and is determined by factors set forth by Youth, Adult and Dislocated Worker Policy Guidelines. These guidelines include low income criteria and barriers to employment such as need to improve education levels, advance life skills, enhance social and community networking knowledge base, enter employment and earn an income that improves the individual's and family's way of life.

Adult Program services include career advising, job seeker services and classroom training.

On-the-Job Training (OJT) is training provided by an employer to the employee/WIOA client while the client is engaged in productive work. OJT is provided under a contract with an employer in the public, private nonprofit or private sector.

Dislocated Worker services are available to any Carter, Elliott or Lawrence county resident who has been terminated or laid off from employment, or has received notification of an upcoming termination or layoff and is unlikely to return to work in his/her previous industry or occupation. A form 4b issued by the Office of Employment & Training upon employment termination is used as the deciding documentation of service eligibility.

Out of School Youth program serves youth who are age 18-24. Individuals who are not currently enrolled or attending any educational institution and have been involved in the criminal justice system can be eligible to receive the following services:

Career Readiness Workshops

Teleworks USA brings employment opportunities that allow individuals to work from home and become wage earners in the global economy without relocating. A Teleworks HUB is located in our Louisa WIOA office, which allows individuals that may have limited or no internet service to become employed through Teleworks USA. Workshops are also given to train and assist jobseekers wanting to take advantage of working from home through Teleworks USA.
